Corporal Acts of Mercy

I'm sure we've all heard the phrase "corporal acts of mercy" but, what does it mean? This phrase encompasses seven acts of love that address the physical and material needs of others. They are: giving food to the hungry, giving drink to

the thirsty, giving clothing to the naked, giving shelter to travelers, visiting the sick, visiting the imprisoned and burying the dead. Each of these are ways we can show the love of Christ to those around us by sharing with them our gifts of time, talent and treasure. Here at Catholic Cemeteries we focus on the last of these – burying the dead, which is a final act of love and mercy toward our loved ones who have died.

At our baptism, we became children of God and

members of the Body of Christ. When we were confirmed, we received the gift of the Holy Spirit, and our bodies became a temple where the Holy Spirit dwells. As such, our body should be treated with great respect, and this respect should not stop at death. We should continue to show our love for the deceased and respect for their body by treating their body with dignity, by providing the body a permanent place of rest.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church states, "The bodies of the dead must be treated with respect and charity, in faith and hope of the Resurrection. The burial of the dead is a corporal act of mercy; it honors the children of God, who are temples of the Holy Spirit." (CCC 2300)

Catholic Cemeteries is frequently asked if cremation is permitted by the Catholic Church, or if cremation is somehow contrary to this dignity and respect we

should show toward the body. The answer is: it depends on our reasoning for cremation. If cremation is being selected to attempt to prevent the resurrection of the body, this would not align with Catholic teaching and would fall contrary to our Catholic faith. If cremation is being selected because the body would then take up less space or somehow

use less resources, or for other personal reasons, cremation is an acceptable form of burial by the Catholic Church.

Each of us at Catholic Cemeteries understands the ministerial aspect of what we do and embrace the opportunity to participate in this corporal act of mercy – burying the dead.

We are each called to be good stewards with the gifts God has given to us, to do as much as possible with what we have been entrusted. This is especially true when you are responsible for a charitable organization such as Catholic Cemeteries of the Archdiocese of Omaha!

As part of our annual budget process, we try to balance maintaining existing buildings and equipment, performing necessary repairs throughout our grounds, replacing items that have exceeded their useful lives as well

as undertaking new projects and offerings. This can be a bit of a juggling act.

But sometimes, unexpected opportunities present themselves and cause us to deviate from our original plan. In recent months this has occurred twice for Catholic Cemeteries. The first opportunity is related to the Archdiocese – they chose to outsource their grounds maintenance at the Chancery offices and were looking to dispose of their equipment. While we hadn't planned to add to our equipment supply at that time, we took advantage of the opportunity and purchased several key equipment items at favorable prices. Although the additional cost wasn't anticipated it will enhance our current inventory for long-term benefit.

Secondly, we were informed that Mother of Perpetual Help Church was closing and wanted to find a suitable home for its altar, ambo and other furnishings. Many of these items needed refurbishing some more than others – but our **Assistant Manager of Operations** was up to the challenge! These items have been refinished and installed in Holy Angels Mausoleum at Resurrection Cemetery, and we will be refinishing items previously in Holy Angels and placing them throughout our cemeteries.

Come and pray with us at one of our upcoming monthly Memorial Masses and see for yourself how beautiful our "new" altar looks! We typically gather at 5 p.m. on the first Monday of each month at Holy Angels Mausoleum for the Mass.



Free Trees from ReTree Nebraska

This year we again received 10 trees from the ReTree planting program, an effort of the Nebraska Forest Service and the Nebraska Statewide Arboretum. The trees have been planted throughout all five of our cemeteries. Free Trees for Fall Planting is supported by the Nebraska Statewide Arboretum's Trees for Nebraska Towns Initiative funded by the Nebraska Environmental Trust, and a U.S. Forest Service Landscape Scale Restoration grant received by the Nebraska Forest Service.

SEEDS SOWN

As we enter a season of new growth and new life, let's also continue to nurture the spiritual seeds God has planted in our hearts during the season of Lent.

The Lord plants many things in our heart during Lent. If we are open to receive them, each seed will bear fruit in our lives and the lives of those we encounter.

I'd like to share with you some of the seeds the Lord planted in my heart this Lent that we can all strive for.

To have humility in our life. Placing others before ourselves, not placing our needs above those we

see with greater need. When we put God first, others second and ourselves third, our lives will be ordered in a way that promotes the Kingdom of God in Heaven and on earth. Be humble as our Lord Jesus Christ was humble, seeking peace in all things.

To give love to others as God has loved us. to turn left in a hallway instead of right. This is true. A left turn led me to my wife two years later! Or maybe we need to experience a loss before we see a greater gain. So be patient with God and let Him give you the peace to be patient with yourself and those you are praying for.

Set aside time in solitude with the Lord in prayer. The Lord wants us to have an intimate relationship with Him. By Jesus' crucifixion, death, and resurrection, He won freedom for each of us and after His ascension, sent the Holy Spirit to convict and guide us in our walk. to live a peace-filled life even in times of trouble, stress and loss. It doesn't mean we will not have pain and sadness in our life, it means during sadness and loss, or even happiness and gain, we will live in faith that the Lord sees all things, and He is with us in all things. We will live in faith knowing that God is with us in the good and the bad. So, when we pray, we should always end with, "Your will be done in all things."

Strive to forgive those who have hurt us in some way. When someone hurts us, it is human nature to become upset or angry. Sometimes the anger comes in a flash and without thinking we respond in a hurtful way. Then in our thoughts we continue to revisit the wrong, and in a very real way allow the hurt to have power over our life and our joy. Even if the person apologizes, we may still hold on to the anger it caused within us. Or if we are hurt by someone inadvertently and they don't realize it, we may still hold on to the anger it caused. In either case, we are the ones holding on to the anger. In essence we place ourselves in emotional and spiritual jail. When this happens, pray to the Holy Spirit, and ask for the strength to forgive the person. Then offer

the pain and the person to Jesus, and spiritually place them at the foot of His Cross. He will take our burden from us, and we will be able to forgive and move on with the freedom He desires for each of us.

Seek opportunities to serve God,

not for our own reward, but to glorify God in all that we do, the big and the small things alike. Ask the Lord in prayer to reveal the ways you can serve Him. He will provide you an abundance of opportunities to serve His people and thereby, you will be serving Him. Be open and He will lead you to places of personal and spiritual growth. He will be present in those you serve, and in you as you serve the less fortunate. Remember to be humble as Jesus was humble. He did all things for the glory of His Father and so should we! Before the start of every effort ask Jesus to glorify the work of your hands, your minds, and your mouth, not for you, but for the glory of our Heavenly Father and His most precious Son, our Lord Jesus Christ.

Let us thank God for the good people and things He has brought into our life. As I look back on my life, I am so grateful for my parents, siblings, wife and children. I am grateful for those who mentored me. I am grateful

Spring - Summer Decoration Guidelines

Flat Markers:

Only fresh flowers are permitted in permanent and approved in-ground vases from April 1st through March 31st. Appropriate artificial decorations may be placed November 1st through March 31st.

Monuments:

Appropriate decorations may be placed year round on the base of an upright memorial as long as they do not interfere with the daily operations of the cemetery.

Mausoleums, Crypts, Niches:

Items can only be placed in or on an approved vase attached to a crypt or niche front. No items can be taped, wired or otherwise attached to the crypt or niche front. Fresh flowers are not permitted in a mausoleum, and will be promptly removed.

Inappropriate Items:

Items not conforming to Catholic Cemeteries' policies, items placed in the ground or those extending onto adjoining graves, crypts or niches will be removed without notice. Out of respect for our consecrated grounds, pets and smoking are not permitted.

Holidays

Appropriate artificial decorations may be placed on in-ground graves starting at noon on the Thursday prior to the following holidays: Easter, Mother's Day, Memorial Day, Father's Day and Independence Day. Decorations must be removed prior to gate closing on the Sunday following these holidays; Catholic Cemeteries will dispose of all decorations beginning on the Monday following these holidays. Live flowers in vases will be removed once they begin wilting.
